Jacob Weidenmann & Cedar Hill Cemetery

You are cordially invited to Jacob Weidenmann & Cedar Hill Cemetery on Thursday, May 21 at 6:00 pm. The program will feature historical actor Jason Scappaticci as Jacob Weidenmann, the landscape architect who designed Cedar Hill. Weidenmann, as portrayed by

Jason, will share details of his life and the early history of Cedar Hill.

Hired in August 1865, Weidenmann oversaw the vast improvements needed to prepare Cedar Hill's grounds. Jason Scappaticci This included and plans;

draining the grounds; laying out sections; building avenues; planting trees and shrubs; and constructing the receiving

tomb. An average gang of 82 laborers and 14 horse carts and ox teams were employed every day up to November 1866 to complete the work.

Cedar Hill began offering lots to the public on July 16, 1866. A July 24th article in the Hartford Courant noted "All the lots, with but few exceptions, on the eastern slope of Sections 1 and 2 – some fifty or sixty in number – are secured, but in Sections 3, 4, 5 and 6, may be found some very desirable lots, fully equal, in the opinion of many, to either of the first two sections."

Following Jason's presentation, Foundation Director Beverly Lucas will lead guests on an abbreviated tour of the memorial grounds. This new tour will focus on early monuments that enhanced the cemetery's landscape as designed by Weidenmann. From the Beach, Colt and Brownell monuments that grace the hill of Section 2 to other memorial stones erected in the 1860s, the tour will showcase Cedar Hill's early years.

Jason Scappaticci has performed numerous times at Cedar Hill. A popular actor in our Lantern Tour. Jason has depicted Allen Ormsbee, a hiker who perished on Mt. Washington and Charles K. Hamilton, a celebrated barnstormer. Jason developed his portrayal of Jacob

Weidenmann as part of Cedar Hill's 150th celebration.

Discover Jacob Weidenmann's Hartford

Cedar Hill Cemetery Foundation is pleased to present *Discover Jacob Weidenmann's Hartford*, a series of programs highlighting the landscape architect's significant contribution to the city of Hartford. The four-part series, a collaboration with Bushnell Park Foundation, includes a panel discussion and guided tour experiences of several Weidenmann landscapes.



Bushnell Park, Hartford

Jacob Weidenmann was one of the leading landscape architects of the 19th century. After emigrating to the U. S., he quickly gained a reputation for excellent design and brilliant solutions to complex engineering and architectural challenges. An innovator in the field, Weidenmann designed Hartford's Bushnell Park and Cedar Hill Cemetery.

On April 23, panelists Don Poland, John Alexopolous and moderator Frank Hagaman will provide historical context for Weidenmann's capitol city projects. The discussion will reflect upon influences, such as Hartford's rapid growth and industrialization, which shaped the desire to "landscape" the city.

Weidenmann's work in Hartford began in 1860 when he accepted the position of Park Superintendent with the purpose of laying out what would become Bushnell Park. On May 7, Don Poland will lead a tour of Bushnell Park focused on its historic development as well as highlighting important architectural features. Following the tour, participants are invited to visit the Butler-McCook Garden and enjoy a reception in this Weidenmann-designed oasis.

On May 16, John Kehoe will lead a tour of the Institute of Living's renowned tree collection, which has been described as "within a relatively small space, perhaps the greatest concentration of historic trees in Connecticut." Although Frederick Law Olmsted designed the grounds of the Institute of Living in 1861, Weidenmann executed the project.

The series concludes on May 21 at Cedar Hill. Actor Jason Scappaticci as Jacob Weidenmann will engage participants with his portrayal of the landscape architect. Foundation Director Beverly Lucas will also lead a tour which focuses on the early history of the cemetery.

Successful 2014 Tours & Events Season

Cedar Hill Cemetery Foundation concluded another successful **Tours & Events** season with 2,248 people participating in various activities. In 2014, the Foundation offered 18 public programs and 16 private tours for school and community groups.

A highlight of the year was Beyond the Gates: Cedar Hill Cemetery Celebrates 150 Years. An estimated 350 people attended the free event which took place on the grounds of Cedar Hill. Beyond the Gates programming illuminated Cedar Hill's rich 19th-century history which shaped the cemetery's park-like memorial grounds and is notably reflected in our landscape and monuments. Costumed dramatizations and musical performances engaged audiences throughout the day.

Cedar Hill was pleased to collaborate with Connecticut Landmarks to present *Victorian Sundays* at the Isham-Terry House. The program featured The Proper Patient of 1900 and Dearly Departed: The

Art of Victorian Mourning. New thematic tours included From Home Fires to Camp Fires, Monuments of James Batterson, Streets of Hartford 2 and What a Way to Go.

Stacy Phillips & Paul Howard entertained guests at Music Among the Memorials and the 7th Annual Mystery Scavenger Hunt delighted all who participated. Foundation Creates Monument Fund

Cedar Hill is one of America's most distinguished rural cemeteries where art, culture, history and nature live in harmonious celebration of the past and where the broad community is invited to become engaged in its preservation efforts.

To address basic preservation concerns, Cedar Hill Cemetery Foundation established a **Monument Fund** to support the care and maintenance of memorials located within the cemetery's historic sections. Created to underwrite small preservation projects, the Monument Fund will support much needed cleaning and minor restoration.

The Foundation's first goal is to raise funds to clean and restore ornamental bronze elements on historic monuments, including several Civil War memorials. Conservator Francis Miller recently examined select monuments at Cedar Hill and prepared condition assessments and treatment proposals. Of those in need of


conservation, the Foundation has identified seven monuments to be the first to be restored with the funds raised.

The monuments — of Joseph Hawley, Griffin Stedman, Henry A. Perkins, Henry Ward Camp, James Laurie, Thomas H. Seymour and the Veteran City Guard — each feature bronze elements from medallions to three dimensional sculptures. In most cases the bronze is soiled with evidence of green or black corrosion. Treatment includes washing the bronze, adding artist pigments as needed to even color, and applying a protective coating to inhibit future deterioration.

The Foundation has raised just over **\$5,000** towards the estimated \$7,800 - \$9,875 needed to preserve these seven monuments. To complement the conservation of the bronze elements, the granite monuments will be cleaned by Cemetery staff as an in-kind donation. This work will address soiled areas and biological growth.

Cedar Hill Cemetery boasts monuments made of brownstone, marble, granite, bronze and zinc. Each material requires its own special treatment. We look forward to addressing preservation concerns beyond our collection of small bronze elements in the near future. This includes projects range from stabilizing the zinc monument of Samuel Coit, to cleaning large bronze statues, and completing the final two phases of the Colt Memorial restoration.

It is the Foundation's hope that the new Monument Fund will thrive as our Tree Fund has. The Tree Fund, created to support the care and planting of trees at Cedar Hill, has helped to offset the cost of planting over 75 trees in the past several years.

Donations may be designated for the Monument Fund or for the specific Colt Memorial Restoration Fund. The Colt Fund, which financed the stabilization of the monument base, will support Phases 2 and 3 of the restoration which includes column repair/stabilization and bronze conservation.
