Limited Schedule of Onsite Programs

The Foundation plans to offer a reduced schedule of onsite programs this year.

State guidelines will regulate the type of activities presented and the measures needed to protect volunteers, staff, and participants.

Social distancing protocols will include:

- Reservations required in advance
- Participation will be limited
- Everyone must wear a mask or face covering over their nose and mouth
- Everyone must practice social distancing with anyone outside of their household
- Programs may be modified or canceled if needed

Cedar Hill's horticultural staff recently planted trees in the historic sections of the cemetery. The new trees replace those lost due to age or inclement weather. Staff planted oak, maple, hackberry, birch, spruce, and dogwood trees.

The new trees contribute to the natural beauty of Cedar Hill. A beauty which brings peace and serenity to all who visit.

Statue of Hope to be Preserved

Thanks to your generous support, the Statue of Hope will be preserved. Your outpouring of support makes the preservation project possible.

Thank you to Monument Fund donors, corporate sponsors, and the **William** and Alice Mortensen Foundation for providing the funds to ensure the bronze statue remains a symbol of Hope for future generations.

Francis Miller of Conserve Art LLC will undertake the project once warm weather arrives. Treatment includes cleaning, removing loose corrosion, and repairing flaws and cracks. Localized patination, preserving the aged green appearance, will provide aesthetic and corrosion resistant benefits. A protective coating followed by paste wax to reduce sheen will complete the project.

The Foundation will document the preservation process with photographs and video. We look forward to sharing details with you through our enewsletter, social media, and website.
