Monuments Cleaned - Thanks to You

Thanks to your generous support, eleven granite monuments were recently cleaned.

Granite monuments often suffer from soiling, discoloration, and organic growth caused by long-term exposure to airborne pollutants. While not uncommon for outdoor monuments, these issues take away from their historic beauty.


Monument Conservation Collaborative and Historic Gravestone Services completed the work which would not have been possible without the support of Monument Fund donors.


The conservators, using biocides followed by a pressurized water rinse treatment, meticulously cleaned the granite stones. The process removed stubborn staining and organic material which concealed decorative details and lettering.

Monuments of all sizes were cleaned. They include the Beckwith, Day, Heublein, Hooker, Long, Munsill, Pope, Stedman, Twichell, Wasserbach, and Weidenmann monuments.

The largest monument cleaned was the Heublein Monument on Section 12. Located under trees, the monument had extensive biological growth on its surface. See page 2 for more about the monument.

Heublein Monument - Recently Cleaned

The Heublein Monument, on Section 12, is an exedra or curved bench.

In ancient Greece, exedras were often used in public squares and were popular spots for the gathering of philosophers and teachers. They were also used in Greek burial grounds.

In American cemeteries, exedras were popular in the late 19th century up until the 1920s. The Heublein Monument dates from 1912-1914.

It is the work of New England Granite Works. The angel is marked "C. Conrads" for sculptor Carl Conrads.

In 1846, James Batterson established

himself in Hartford as proprietor of a stoneyard. He produced cemetery monuments and was an importer and dealer in stone.

After several name changes, the company became known as New England Granite Works. The business operated until 1926.

To prepare for the post-Civil War demand for cemetery and other monuments, Batterson brought Carl Conrads to Hartford.

Born in Germany, Conrads graduated from the Academy of Fine Arts in Munich before arriving in New York City in 1860. After serving in the Union Army, he worked as

Batterson's house sculptor from 1866 to 1903.

The monument graces the large lot owned by Gilbert F. Heublein. His father, Andrew, founded the family restaurant and hotel business in 1862. In 1890, Gilbert and his brother, Louis, took over. Five years later, the company began producing A1 Steak Sauce.

The company was known for creating the first premixed cocktail bottles. It expanded to include a hotel in downtown Hartford, the acquisition of Grey Poupon, and an extensive liquor distribution.

Lecture on Gargoyles in May

illustrated lecture, giving you a taste of the variety of ornament, history, and humor these campuses have to offer. Connecticut schools featured in the lecture include Yale University and Trinity College.

Birdwatching Lecture in April

Want to learn how to watch birds?

Join us for *Birdwatching for Beginners*, an illustrated presentation by artist and naturalist Robert Braunfield.
While actually drawing birds in front of the audience, Braunfield will discuss ways to identify birds with sketches of size, shape, behavior, coloration, migration, and more. It is a uniquely educational, and entertaining, way to learn the basics of birdwatching.

Braunfield's artwork and writings have appeared in numerous national publications and in exhibitions as diverse as the Arizona Sonora Desert Museum, Mystic Aquarium, and Bloomingdale's in New York.

He illustrated the popular books, *Good Birders Don't Wear White: 50 Tips From North America's Top Birders* and *Good Birders Still Don't Wear White.* His wood bird sculptures have won numerous awards and have been exhibited nationally.

He teaches bird watching classes, leads birding trips, and has overseen a number of conservation projects and research studies. His 25-year Bluebird
